## HCR 16—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

(Inviting H. Ross Perot to address a Joint Session of the Texas Legislature)

Mr. Johnson offered the following resolution:

## HCR 16

Whereas, A prominent industrialist and distinguished citizen of Dallas, H. Ross Perot, has given generously of his personal fortune and his time in untiring efforts to bring about the release and return to their families of American prisoners of war now held against all rules of the Geneva Convention in North Vietnam; and

Whereas, The Legislature of the State of Texas and all citizens of this state are united behind Mr. Perot and his determined action to improve the lot of our American soldiers held so unjustly in the prisoner compounds of North Vietnam, the men who have been deprived of communications from home and whose captors will allow them none of the guarantees of the Geneva Convention; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 62nd Legislature, the Senate concurring, That H. Ross Perot of Dallas, Texas, humanitarian and great American, be and he is hereby invited to address a Joint Session of the Texas Legislature on a date convenient to him with the approval of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor; and, be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this Resolution be prepared for H. Ross Perot as his official invitation from the Texas Legislature.

## HCR 18—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

(Inviting Jerry Rangel to address a Joint Session of the Texas Legislature)

Mr. Lombardino offered the following resolution:

**HCR 18**

Whereas, A young San Antonio police officer, Jerry Rangel, has made a great contribution to the citizens of his state by his recent and daring undercover work to expose drug abuse; and

Whereas, The exploits of this young man began in February of 1970, when as a patrolman on the San Antonio police force he was selected by the narcotics division to undertake a daring assignment which would require him to live the life of a "dope addict" in order to infiltrate the illicit drug market; and

Whereas, This young man's performance has been acclaimed as a milestone in police undercover operations; his efforts during a period of over a year enabled officials to issue warrants for the arrest of 108 people, 98 on state and 10 on federal warrants, on heroin and marijuana charges; and

Whereas, He was born in Castroville, Texas, on February 12, 1947, and then moved to San Antonio at the age of 3 months, attending public schools there and graduating from Fox Tech High School in 1966; and

Whereas, This fine officer's background is equally as outstanding as his recent exploits; he served with distinction under the flag of his country in the Republic of Vietnam from January, 1967, until December 31, 1967, with the 9th Infantry Division and saw extensive combat; and

Whereas, Jerry Rangel returned from overseas with a fervent belief in the principles of his country and, as though it were not enough that he had offered his life in service during a time of war, his dignity as an American and his concern for those less fortunate citizens who could not help themselves compelled him to abandon his childhood dream of becoming a lawyer so that he might become involved with social problems on a more personal level as a police officer; and

Whereas, He entered the police academy in April, 1969, graduating in July, 1969, and in November, he was married to the former Janie Balderas; and

Whereas, Officer Rangel and his wife became parents of a son, born on September 3, 1970, while this dedicated policeman was still working undercover; and

Whereas, It is an easier task to understand and respect the kind of man that he is than to emulate the kind of Americanism that Jerry Rangel exemplifies; he volunteered for and succeeded at one of the most difficult and dangerous jobs confronting law enforcement personnel, doing so with the conviction that by exposing drug addicts and "pushers" not only could they be rehabilitated into useful and productive citizens but also many young people would be spared the cruel existence perpetuated by the taking of drugs; he sacrificed his homelife, the companionship of a fine wife and a newborn son whom he was unable to see for many months to insure that his duty would be carried out to the fullest; and

Whereas, It is most appropriate that the Texas Legislature recognize the significant contributions made by this great American, Jerry Rangel,

who is to be highly commended for his motivation, conceived during service to his country in a critical time of war; for his spirit of sacrifice in undertaking the most difficult of tasks; for his devotion to duty arising from a greater dedication to the ideals of God, family and country; and for his belief that a better society is possible for all men; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Texas, the Senate concurring, That the Texas Legislature issue special commendation to this outstanding citizen, Jerry Rangel, and express profound appreciation for his service to his city, his state, and his country; and that, in accordance with the wishes of the Members of both Houses of the Texas Legislature, he be invited to address a Joint Session of the Texas Legislature on Tuesday, February 9, at 11:30 a.m.; and, be it further

Resolved, That official copies of this Resolution be prepared for officer Jerry Rangel and his family as a token of high esteem from the Texas Legislature and as an expression of sincere appreciation to him for his service and sacrifice on behalf of his fellow Texans.

#### HSR 48—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

(Concerning future construction and renovation in the Capitol and its environs)

Mr. McAlister offered the following resolution:

#### HSR 48

Whereas, The House of Representatives of the State of Texas acknowledges the necessity for efficiency in state government and for the construction of new buildings in the Capitol area; and

Whereas, The House also maintains that the preservation of the historical, architectural, and cultural integrity of the State Capitol, the Governor's Mansion, and environs is in the best interest of the state government and of all present and future Texans; and

Whereas, It is possible that in some instances construction and renovation in the Capitol and its environs have already impaired this integrity and that proposed construction and renovation might further blemish the state's heritage of historic public buildings; and

Whereas, Legislators and people of Texas have a right to be apprised of any future plans for construction and renovation in the Capitol and its environs; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the 62nd Legislature of the State of Texas direct the State Building Commission and other appropriate state agencies to work together to develop and make known a long-range master plan for future construction and renovation in the Capitol and its environs which will take into consideration the preservation and protection of the historical, architectural, and cultural integrity of the State Capitol, the Governor's Mansion, and environs.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on House Administration.

## HSR 52—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

(Creating an interim committee to study the growing problem of pornography)

Mr. Harold Davis offered the following resolution:

**HSR 52**

Whereas, The growing problem of pornography and obscenity in movies, magazines, and books is of vital concern to the citizens of Texas; and

Whereas, Obscene literature is not only being marketed on newsstands but is being sent through the mails to many Texans who have not solicited this disgusting material; and

Whereas, Various state provisions attempting to control the sale and distribution of obscene materials have been overturned by the state and federal courts, often leaving little protection for the Texas citizens who are the innocent victims of such pornography; and

Whereas, It is the continuing responsibility of the State government to control the sale and distribution of pornographic and obscene materials and to control the showing of obscene movies; such control is in the interests of the morals and general welfare of the citizens of Texas; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the 62nd Legislature hereby create an interim committee to study the growing problem of pornography in Texas and the feasibility and desirability of establishing new laws or provisions in order to control more effectively the dissemination of pornography through movies, magazines, and books; and, be it further

Resolved, That the Speaker of the House shall appoint five Members of the House of Representatives and three citizens, who are interested in the problem to serve on the special interim committee; and, be it further

Resolved, That the interim study committee be authorized to confer with federal officials, congressmen, senators, and members of the federal judiciary in gathering information and data for the study; and, be it further

Resolved, That from the Contingent Expense Fund of the House of Representatives the committee members shall be reimbursed for their actual expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of this Resolution; the committee shall prepare a budget for its operating expenses, which shall be submitted to the House Administration Committee, and no expenditure shall be made until the budget has been approved. Prior approval of nonbudgeted expenditures must also be obtained from the House Administration Committee; and, be it further

Resolved, That the committee shall make its complete report, including findings and recommendations and drafts of any legislation deemed necessary, to the 63rd Legislature when it convenes in January, 1973, and that five copies of the completed study shall be filed in the Legislative Reference Library and five copies filed in the office of the Texas Legislative Council. Following official distribution of the committee report, all remaining copies shall be deposited with the Legislative Reference Librarian.

**HSR 53—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE**

(Granting the Boy Scouts permission to use the Hall of the House on February 6, 1971)

Mr. Shannon offered the following resolution:

**HSR 53**

Whereas, It has been traditional for Boy Scouts from throughout the State to visit Austin and the Capitol and to report to the Governor and the State; and

Whereas, It has also been traditional for the Boy Scouts to meet in the Hall of the House of Representatives for this occasion; and

Whereas, This House heartily endorses the aims and ideals of Scouting and commends the achievements of Texas Boy Scouts; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Texas, That, in accordance with Section 3, Rule 1, of the Rules of the House of Representatives, the Boy Scouts are granted permission to use the Hall of the House in the State Capitol on Saturday, February 6, 1971, for their traditional "Report to the State."

The resolution was referred to the Committee on House Administration.

**HSR 55—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE**

(Creating a special House Committee for Parking Liaison)

Mr. Wieting offered the following resolution:

**HSR 55**

Whereas, Parking for the thousands of automobiles used by employees and officials of the State of Texas in getting to their work in the Capitol Complex is a major problem which is further complicated by the fact that The University of Texas, with abutting property, has even greater numbers of students seeking places to leave their automobiles as they attend classes; and

Whereas, Involved in working on solutions to the ever-growing problem of finding sufficient parking spaces to meet the needs in the Capitol Complex now and under conditions of future growth are the State Board of Control, the Texas Building Commission, the Texas Highway Department, The University of Texas at Austin, the City of Austin Department of Traffic and Transportation, and the House of Representatives of the State of Texas; and

Whereas, The State Board of Control has recently reported that the waiting list of employees desiring parking spaces on state lots is now

in excess of 1,800, and this situation will be complicated even further as new buildings are erected in the Capitol Complex on property now being used as parking lots; and

Whereas, During the interim following sessions of the 61st Legislature, the House Interim Committee on Parking Difficulties in and around the State Capitol completed an excellent study on this subject and recommended that the study be continued or that another committee be created to work in this area so important to the efficient functioning of state government; and

Whereas, It is imperative that the House of Representatives, as one of the entities seeking a solution to the problems of parking in the Capitol Complex, create or designate a specific committee to serve as a liaison between the House of Representatives and the other departments, agencies, and institutions of the State of Texas and the City of Austin in formulating a permanent plan for parking which will meet present and estimated needs; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the 62nd Legislature hereby create a special House Committee for Parking Liaison to be composed of three Members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and, be it further

Resolved, That the committee shall act for the entire House of Representatives in providing a liaison between the House and representatives of the State Board of Control, the Building Commission, the Texas Highway Department, The University of Texas at Austin, and the Department of Traffic and Transportation of the City of Austin as the effort goes forward to reach a solution to traffic and parking problems in the Capitol Complex through a permanent and efficient master plan for parking.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Interim Activities.

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#### HCR 17—REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

(Setting aside the week of April 26 to May 1, 1971 as Trash Round-up Week)

Mr. Atwell offered the following resolution:

#### HCR 17

Whereas, Beer cans along the rights-of-way of our highways, broken bottles and plastic cups and containers in our streams and lakes, unsightly papers and other trash cluttering the parks and woodlands, all dim the beauty and mar the enjoyment of the natural wonders, the historical and archeological structures with which the Lone Star State is endowed; and

Whereas, Texas ranks foremost among the states for its system of roadside parks, but thousands of Texas dollars are spent each year by the Texas Highway Department in picking up the trash that thoughtless citizens and visitors leave in them and along our peerless highways; and

Whereas, The Texas system of state parks extends from the white sand beaches of the Gulf Coast to the mountains of far West Texas, from the piney woods of East Texas to the tropical splendor of the Rio Grande Valley, and the Texas Legislature has done all within its power to provide the funds that have made these parks outstanding in the nation, but here again the litter left by careless Texans and tourists often makes the parks unsightly before maintenance men can begin the costly job of cleaning up; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 62nd Legislature, the Senate concurring, That the Texas Legislature hereby set aside the week of April 26 to May 1, 1971, as Trash Round-Up Week in Texas, and urge all citizens of this state to join in an all-out effort to clean up our roadsides, our parks, our streams and lakes, and our own individual property, so that the entire State of Texas will sparkle from north to south, from east to west.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Highways and Roads.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION ON FIRST READING

The following House Joint Resolution was today laid before the House, read first time and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments:

By Lombardino and Dramberger:

HJR 20, A Joint Resolution proposing a Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving spouse and minor children of any person killed while assisting a law enforcement officer or fireman in the performance of hazardous official duties, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of necessary medical and hospital expenses of any person injured while assisting a law enforcement officer or fireman in the performance of official duties.

HB 160, A bill to be entitled An Act relating to providing a presumption that a person knowingly receives or conceals stolen property under certain circumstances; amending Article 1430, Penal Code of Texas, 1925; and declaring an emergency.

HB 161, A bill to be entitled An Act increasing the minimum penalty for murder; increasing the maximum penalty the jury may assess for murder if the jury fails to find malice aforethought; amending Article 1257, Penal Code of Texas, 1925, as amended; amending Section 3-a, Chapter 274, Acts of the 40th Legislature, Regular Session, 1927, as amended (Article 1257b, Vernon's Texas Penal Code); and declaring an emergency.

HB 162, A bill to be entitled An Act relating to the minimum amount of time which must be served before release on parole from a penal or correctional institution of this state; amending Subsection (a), Section 15, Article 42.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, 1965, as amended; and declaring an emergency.

Referred to Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence.

By Golman and McKissack:

HB 163, A bill to be entitled An Act relating to the certification of schools offering instruction at preschool, kindergarten, or elementary grade levels; amending Subchapter B of Chapter 11, Texas Education Code, by adding a new Section 11.261; and declaring an emergency.

Referred to Committee on Public Education.

HB 164, A bill to be entitled An Act relating to time allowed to an employee without deduction of pay for voting at an election; amending Article 209, Penal Code of Texas, 1925; and declaring an emergency.
