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again. These expenses obviously cannot be sustained on the small budgets provided to most boards. As a matter of fact, the majority of the boards are simply not complying with the criminal history checks because of the prohibitive cost. This bill would replace this onerous, impractical, and unobserved requirement by providing for quarterly to annual criminal history checks at a reasonable cost of about \$300 to \$500 per board. More frequent checks are not necessary. Very few licensees come up with a conviction — doctors, pharmacists, dentists and veterinarians do not have a high crime rate. The bill would provide adequate protection for the public because it would ensure that criminal history checks would be performed at least annually, giving adequate time to weed out any offenders. **OPPONENTS** Even though very few convictions of health care professionals may turn up, SAY: those that do are worth the effort of more frequent criminal history checks. This safeguard is necessary because many of these licensees can prescribe drugs and care for sick and vulnerable people. NOTES: The committee substitute changed the frequency requirements for submitting lists for criminal history checks from not more than four times a year to at least once a year but not more than quarterly.
