|                    | During the same session, the Legislature also enacted HB 139 by Wise, relating to nitrous oxide, an abusable volatile chemical. It amended some of the sections repealed by HB 2950 and kept them in law.   |
| DIGEST:            | SB 910 would repeal the amendments made by HB 139 to conform with the changes made by HB 2950.  |
|                    | The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2005.  |
