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CSHB 389 would be a small but important step in modernizing old statutes and language that authorize and establish procedures for eminent domain. Relocating the statutory basis of eminent domain authority for TWU to the Education Code would clarify that power and explicitly subject it to the processes in place for eminent domain proceedings located in Property Code, sec. 21.021. In so doing, the bill also would bring TWU's eminent domain authority into line with other Texas universities.

CSHB 389 would neither expand nor restrict TWU's authority to exercise eminent domain. TWU already possesses the same power of eminent domain as is granted to the University of Texas System. Bringing the source and scope of this power into modern, accessible statutes would help in current and future efforts to make eminent domain authority in Texas consistent and equitable for all involved parties.

A February 2006 Texas Legislative Council report identified 208 references in statutes granting entities the power of eminent domain and another 81 references limiting or prohibiting the exercise of the power. The Legislature should review carefully all eminent domain statutes and references and determine which still are relevant to agencies that exercise that power. CSHB 389 would remove an antiquated reference to eminent domain and update the statutory location of this authority as it applies to TWU.
