BACKGROUND: William "Willie" Cardenas Velasquez contributed to the inclusion of

Latinos and other minorities in the democratic process through his work as the president and founder of the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project (SVREP). SVREP conducted nearly 1,000 voter registration campaigns in more than 200 cities and Native American reservations and

won more than 85 voting rights lawsuits.

On September 29, 1995, President Bill Clinton posthumously awarded Mr.

Velasquez the Presidential Medal of Freedom and he became the second

Hispanic ever to receive that award.

DIGEST: HB 2118 would designate May 9 as Willie Velasquez Day in observance

of the birthday of William "Willie" Cardenas Velasquez.

The day would be an optional state holiday. State agencies would remain open at a minimum level, but employees could have a day off with pay in exchange for working on another prescribed holiday falling on a weekday. The bill would specify that the total number of holidays in a year to which

a state agency employee was entitled would not be changed.
