DIGEST: CSHB 4014 would prohibit a school district board of trustees or school

district employee from directly or indirectly requiring or coercing a school

district employee to:

 make a contribution to a charitable organization or in response to a fundraiser; or

• attend a meeting called for the purpose soliciting charitable contributions.

CSHB 4014 would prohibit a school district board of trustees or school district employee from directly or indirectly requiring or coercing a school district employee to refrain from:

- making a contribution to a charitable organization or in response to a fundraiser; or
- attending a meeting called for the purpose soliciting charitable contributions.

The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2009.

NOTES:

The substitute differs from the bill as filed by prohibiting a school district from requiring or coercing any school district employee, rather than any teacher, to make or to refrain from making a charitable contribution.
