BACKGROUND: Sec. 29.1534, Education Code requires the Texas Education Agency

(TEA) to develop strategies regarding methods to increase community awareness of prekindergarten programs through programs that provide information relating to public assistance. The agency may develop outreach materials for use by school districts to increase community

awareness of prekindergarten programs.

A school district must report annually to TEA the strategies implemented by the school district to increase community awareness of prekindergarten programs. TEA must post each report on the agency's website. The reporting requirement for school districts will expire September 1, 2013.

TEA must provide information to school districts regarding effective methods to communicate to the parent of an eligible child about the

availability of prekindergarten programs.

DIGEST: HB 1834 would repeal sec. 29.1534, Education Code, requiring reporting

on strategies to increase community awareness of prekindergarten

programs.

The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2011.

SUPPORTERS SAY:

HB 1834 would remove an unnecessary reporting requirement that is a burden to both school districts and the TEA. The current requirement is duplicative of sec. 29.153(e), Education Code, which requires school districts to develop a system to notify parents about available prekindergarten programs. This notification adequately raises awareness in communities as shown by the high enrollment in prekindergarten classes.

OPPONENTS SAY:

Prekindergarten awareness efforts should be reported to the TEA because prekindergarten is so crucial. Any opportunity to assess school district efforts to increase awareness is valuable.
