BACKGROUND:	Education Code, sec. 7.057 allows a person to file an appeal to the commissioner of education if the person is aggrieved by the actions or decisions of any school district board of trustees that violate school laws or an employment contract that causes monetary harm to the employee.
DIGEST:	CSHB 2952 would require the commissioner of education to issue a decision in an appeal against a school district within 240 days after the appeal was filed. Appeals covered by the bill would be appeals without inperson hearings. The parties to the appeal could agree in writing to extend the decision deadline by not more than 60 days.

This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2013.
