BACKGROUND: Education Code, sec. 39.023(b) requires the Texas Education Agency

(TEA) to develop appropriate criterion-referenced alternative assessment instruments to be administered to students in a special education program that would provide an appropriate measure of student achievement, as determined by the student's admission, review, and dismissal committee.

DIGEST: SB 1309 would require the TEA to redevelop special education

assessment instruments for significantly cognitively disabled students in a

manner consistent with federal law.

The assessment instrument could not require a teacher to prepare tasks or

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materials for a student who would be administered such an assessment.

The redeveloped assessments would have to be administered no later than the 2014-2015 school year.

This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2013.

NOTES:

The Legislative Budget Board estimates that SB 1309 would cost \$1.1 million in general revenue to redevelop the alternative assessment in fiscal 2014.
