BACKGROUND:

Education Code sec. 37.108 requires each school district or public junior college district to adopt and implement a multihazard emergency operation plan that addresses mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery for certain emergency situations. Documents relating to the district's plan are subject to disclosure for certain purposes.

Concerned parties have noted that schools are not required to have a plan in place in the event of an active shooter.

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DIGEST:

HB 2195 would require a school district to include in its multihazard emergency operations plan a policy for responding to an active shooter emergency. The bill would allow the district to use any available community resources in developing the operations plan.

A document relating to the multihazard operations plan would be subject to disclosure if it enabled a person to verify that the district had established a policy for responding to an active shooter emergency.

This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2019.
