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SUPPORTERSHB 4165 would allow community colleges in Bexar County to addressSAY:workforce needs by increasing the educational opportunities available
through public junior colleges.

By increasing the number of baccalaureate degrees that could be offered in this region, the bill would enable each junior college in the Alamo College District to offer at least one baccalaureate degree program. The district intends to implement two degree programs in internet technology, as well as degree programs in public safety, nursing, teaching, and physical therapy assistance. These degrees would align directly with the workforce needs of San Antonio and would provide residents with a low cost option to gain valuable and marketable skills.

OPPONENTSHB 4165 could give public junior colleges too much discretion to offerSAY:baccalaureate degree programs. These institutions should remain two year
institutions that offer associate degrees, as is their statutory intention.
