This bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2019.

SUPPORTERS HB 422 would ensure that all school districts were complying with the SAY: important responsibility of creating site-based decision-making committees, which play an important role in establishing and reviewing educational plans, goals, performance objectives, and major classroom instructional programs. Because current law does not mandate regular checks into whether school boards are creating these committees, a lack of properly constituted committees is not uncommon. This bill would help the Texas Education Agency ensure that school boards were complying with the law.
