	The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2019.		
SUPPORTERS SAY:	CSHB 4310 would recognize the right of teachers to determine the level of instruction based on the students' mastery of the material rather than a timetable imposed from outside the classroom. This bill would ensure that teachers were not penalized for organizing class time around the needs of their students.		
OPPONENTS SAY:	CSHB 4310 would remove a district's ability to ensure that students were being taught the essential knowledge and skills related to a given subject. Scope and sequence requirements are a valuable tool districts use to ensure students meet state curriculum guidelines. To help students achieve these goals, districts must be able to require teachers to adhere to the relevant guidelines.
