BACKGROUND: Penal Code sec. 22.01 makes assault a criminal offense. Offenses

generally are class A misdemeanors (up to one year in jail and/or a maximum fine of \$4,000) but are increased to a third-degree felony (two to 10 years in prison and an optional fine of up to \$10,000) if committed

against certain types of individuals.

Penal Code sec. 22.02 establishes the offense of aggravated assault. Offenses generally are second-degree felonies (two to 20 years in prison and an optional fine of up to \$10,000) but are increased to first-degree felonies (life in prison or a sentence of five to 99 years and an optional fine of up to \$10,000) under certain circumstances.

Concerns have been raised about attacks on process servers, who are vital to the judicial process in Texas. Some have proposed increasing the penalty for assaulting a process server to better protect them and deter

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assaults.

DIGEST:

HB 1306 would make assault a third-degree felony and aggravated assault a first-degree felony if committed against a person the individual knew was a process server and while the persons was performing a duty as a process server.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2021, and would apply only to an offense committed on or after that date.
