BACKGROUND: Tax Code sec. 26.04 requires the officer or employee designated by a

taxing unit to calculate the unit's no-new-revenue and voter-approval property tax rates to post prominently on the home page of the taxing

unit's website the tax rates and certain other information.

Some have proposed requiring tax notices to be posted in a newspaper so

that rural Texans who lack reliable internet can access that information.

DIGEST: HB 1360 would require the designated officer or employee of a taxing

unit to publish in a newspaper certain property tax rates and other

information currently required to be posted on the taxing unit's website.

The bill would take effect January 1, 2022, and apply only to a property

tax year that began on or after that date.
