BACKGROUND: Concerns have been raised about the lack of an independent entity to

> receive and resolve complaints against the Department of Family and Protective Services. There have been calls to make the Health and Human

Services ombudsman office responsible for such complaints.

DIGEST: SB 1628 would transfer responsibility for receiving and resolving

> complaints against the Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) from DFPS to the Health and Human Services Commission

> (HHSC) ombudsman office and make conforming changes to statute.

The bill would repeal a requirement for the HHSC executive

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commissioner to develop a process for addressing an appeal by a person dissatisfied with the resolution of a complaint against DFPS at the regional level. Instead, the bill would require the executive commissioner to develop a consistent, statewide process for encouraging the submission of complaints to local DFPS personnel before contacting the HHSC's ombudsman office to allow department staff an opportunity to resolve the complaints.

The HHSC executive commissioner would be required to adopt rules necessary to implement the bill by January 1, 2022, and the bill would apply only to a complaint filed on or after that date.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2021.
