BACKGROUND:	Concerns have been raised that the lack of minimum durations final protective orders may make it difficult for victims to acqu necessary resources to ensure their safety and protection.	
DIGEST:	HB 2093 extend the duration of a protective order related to set or abuse, indecent assault, stalking, or trafficking from any per or shorter than the duration of the lives of the offender and vict period of at least one year. The bill also would specify that the protective orders related to family violence would be for a perio than one year and not more than two years, rather than a maxin years. The bill would take effect September 1, 2023, and would apply	iod equal to im to a duration of od not less num of two
