BACKGROUND: Some have suggested that excluding environmental, social, and

governance (ESG) preferences from bids for state transportation project

materials could help make project costs more affordable.

DIGEST: HB 2977 would prohibit the Department of Transportation, in comparing

bids for materials to be used in a state highway improvement project, from giving preference to a bid that proposed using certain materials based on environmental, social, and governance (ESG) criteria, including carbon emission criteria, if the proposed materials were less cost effective or

durable than alternatives for the same project.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2023.
