BACKGROUND: Concerns have been raised that current law related to trafficking of

persons does not provide adequate protection for college students, who

may be particularly vulnerable to trafficking and exploitation.

DIGEST: HB 3553 would expand the conduct constituting a first-degree felony of

trafficking of persons if the offense was committed on the premises of or within 1,000 feet of the premises of a public, private, or independent higher education institution. Such an offense would be punishable by imprisonment in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for life or for a

term of not more than 99 years or less than 25 years.

The bill would take effect September 1, 2023, and would apply only to an

offense committed on or after that date.
