BACKGROUND: Some have suggested that data related to foreign emission sources could

help to address foreign air pollution that may be impacting air quality in

some areas of the state and contributing to nonattainment areas for

national air quality standards.

DIGEST: CSHB 4932 would require the Texas Commission on Environmental

Quality (TCEQ) to request the amount of foreign emissions that are detected or estimated to be at each federal air quality monitoring site

located in each nonattainment area in Texas. This information would have

to be requested from the Administrator of the EPA by October 1, 2023.

If TCEQ did not receive this information within 180 days of the request, it

would be required to estimate the amount of relevant foreign emissions.

TCEQ could contract with a third party to conduct the estimate.

The bill would require TCEQ's executive director to report to TCEQ,

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based on the information collected, a recommendation on whether to revise the state implementation plan to account for the amount of foreign emissions in each nonattainment area.

CSHB 4932 would expire September 1, 2027. The bill would take immediate effect if finally passed by a two-thirds record vote of the membership of each house. Otherwise, it would take effect September 1, 2023.

NOTES:

The fiscal impact to the state cannot be determined because the determination of whether the bill requires the analysis of foreign emissions is unknown. The cost of estimating foreign emissions independently, or through a third-party entity, is unknown.
